Hungary invite for Romanian dissident 22.4.89 89

HE former Hungarian Foreign Minister, Mr Janos Peter, yesterday invited a Romanian dissident, Mr Corneliu Manescu, to Hungary for

medical treatment. Mr Manescu, a former Hungarian Foreign Minister, was one of the six signatories of last

month's letter criticising Presi-

dent Ceausescu. Mr Manescu and his col-

leagues objected to harsh economic measures introduced to help Romania pay off its foreign debt. They demanded an end to Romania's widely criticised village demolition scheme as well as constitutional guarantees for civil rights. They also demanded that Romania stop its food export policy which was "endangering the nation

biologically". President Ceausescu was criticised for "discrediting socialism" and "moving the country

away from Europe". The fate of the signatories is

unclear but sources in Romania say Mr Manescu, who suffers from an ulcer, is now under house arrest. His health is said to be deteriorating. Mr Peter has gone as far as to say "His life is in danger"
